



Wreck Diving German Submarine U-1105



Join Woodbridge Scuba in Exploring the only German U-boat at the bottom of the Potomac.

In 1944 a modified Type VII-C German submarine, began her brief and dramatic wartime career. Germany used its precious supply of rubber to coat the outer skin of less than 10 experimental submarines. The mission of the U-1105 was to find an Allied combat ship and sink it. It was then to descend to 100 meters (330 fsw) and hold that depth to determine whether the Allied ships could find it using sonar. The test was successful. They could not. Weeks later the war ended. The sub surrendered and was brought to the Potomac River. It was sunk the final time near Piney Point, Maryland on September 19, 1949. It has been there since.

The dive boat is pictured above. Our Captain has been plying the waters of the Chesapeake for 30 years. You can expect a depth of 65 feet to the Conning tower and 84 feet to the silt. Visibility can range from 2 feet to 10 feet. Water temperature in July should be around 78 degrees F on the surface and 5-10 below that on the bottom. It is a challenging and invigorating dive.

Required Equipment: Two Tanks (Filled), Regulator w/alternate air source, Buoyancy Compensator, Weights and Weight Belt, Wetsuit, Air Gauge, Depth Gauge, Bottom Timer or Computer, Dive Tables, Knife, Certification Card(s), Logbook, Wreck Reel, Lift Bag, Underwater light, Surface Signaling device Dive Insurance.

Recommended Equipment: Gloves, Hood, Sea Sick Medicine, Camera, Save-A-Dive kit, Dry Bag, Slate, Lunch/drinks, Sunglasses, Sunscreen, Hat, Warm Clothes, Towel, Redundant Light.

You are responsible for your own transportation to the dock. Driving time from Northern Virginia is about 2 hours.
